Overwintering Plants in Containers

If you have perennials in a container, you may be able to overwinter them in your planter by following these simple precautions:

The container must have drainage holes.

Your plant (s) should be cold hardy to two zones colder than your location (zone 6a in Dayton/Xenia area).

Water the plant well before the soil freezes.

There are three basic ways to protect your plant.

- You can bury the entire container in the ground and cover it with soil, leaves or mulch
- Move your container into an unheated garage or shed.

 Group your pots together in a protected location and cover them with leaves, branches or a thermal blanket. Tipping them on their side prevents water from gathering in the root zone thus causing crown rot.

In the Spring, remove the cover as the days warm up and slowly re-acclimate your plants.




Fall Lawn Care – Putting your lawn to bed for Winter

What should I do to get my lawn ready for Winter. I get this question a lot from homeowners and by my neighbors. The topics for consideration of general lawn care include fertilization, turf height, removal of leaves, weed control, aeration, and soil testing. What about fall fertilizers. Couple of things – once soils are frozen – nitrogen and granular applications will have limited use. Fertilization in late November is not recommended. We would not recommend slow-release Nitrogen fertilizer anymore – it won't break down and be taken up in time and then becomes environmental issue – quick release more beneficial so that it gets taken up and used. But because many lawns are approaching dormancy, it's probably too late to apply.


USDA Updates the Plant Hardiness Zone Map in 2023



The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) recently announced it has updated its Plant Hardiness Zone Map. You will see that Ohio has 4 zones, including: 5b; 6a; 6b; and 7a. The hardiness map looks at low temperatures and indicates and average low for each of the zones. SLF Update - Ohio's Spotted Lanternfly Quarantine Expanded and More



As spotted lanternfly (SLF) adult activity winds down for the 2023 season, the Ohio Department of Agriculture (ODA) has updated the Ohio SLF quarantine. Currently there are 11 Ohio counties that are quarantined as a way to reduce, or hopefully eliminate, the artificial spread of SLF to other non-infested areas. Those quarantined counties include: Columbiana, Cuyahoga, Erie, Franklin, Hamilton, Jefferson, Lorain, Lucas, Mahoning, Muskingum, and Ottawa. While there have been single finds of SLF in several other Ohio Counties, a quarantine is enacted when a reproducing population is discovered. This includes finding multiple life-stages, and often includes egg masses, not just a single find.
